

We start our pilgrimage with a fairly long day's walk but it is mostly along shared footway/cycleways so easy walking. The terrain is varied: mostly alongside the River Avon but also along disused railway lines and some roads and other paths. The Sunday morning service that we are attending is Choral Matins at St Mary Redcliffe which was described by Queen Elizabeth I as "The fairest, goodliest and most famous parish church in England" when she visited Bristol in 1574. Those wanting to receive Anglican Communion today should miss some of breakfast and make their way to the 8am service in Bristol Cathedral. Our accommodation in Bath is split between an RC church and the adjacent primary school.


About the lunch pub: The Lock Keeper is very attractive and friendly. It is a Youngs pub by the river with a huge beer garden. We may eat our pilgrim sarnies on the picnic tables in the car park to the left. They are likely to be busy on a Sunday in August.

A&B Pilgrimage History : This year is the first time that our pilgrimage has visited Bristol, but for Bath it's the fourth time. Bath was the destination of the 1986 and 1999 St Dunstan pilgrimages, and the starting point of the 2012 pilgrimage to Exeter.

Profile (Scale 0 to 250 ft): Each day the route card shows the route profile. But don't be misled: be aware that it is a different scale each day! Today's profile is that of a fairly flat day, as we stay close to the River Avon. We reach a maximum altitude of a mere 150ft above sea level just before the end.



DAY 3 Monday August 14 Bath to Melksham 16.2 miles

LEADER: Danny Thomas and Mark Potter

Addresses

Apart from a few short slopes, this is a generally flat day's walk. Leaving the impressive church of Our Lady & St Alphege, the first part of the walk is along the disused Somerset & Dorset railway, now a pedestrian and cycle route called the Two Tunnels Greenway. This passes through two old railway tunnels, the first 300 metres long, the second 1670 metres; the UK's longest cycling and walking tunnel. After the tunnels the route crosses the tall viaduct at Tucking Mill, after which we descend to a quiet lane leading to Monkton Combe and a morning prayer stop in the church. Harry Patch, the longest surviving soldier from the WW1 trenches, is buried in the graveyard. Passing Monkton School and its playing fields the walk then reaches a remnant of the old Coal Canal and the Kennet & Avon Canal, crossing the impressive and historic Dundas Aqueduct. The towpath, with views of the River Avon valley and railway passing through it, leads to Avoncliff and the Cross Guns pub by the canal for lunch. After lunch, the walk proceeds to Bradford on Avon, with a brief visit to its medieval tithe barn, its Saxon church and nearby parish church. Then, after crossing fields, the walk returns to the canal towpath. Passing through the marinas of Staverton, a long easterwards canal stretch ends when the route diverts northwards on the locally-called "old road" and then a main road into the centre of Melksham and our overnight stop at the United Church.



About the lunch pub: The Cross Guns is a stunning 16th century inn situated on the bank of the Kennet and Avon canal. Food needs to be pre-ordered. Pilgrims may not eat their pilgrim sarnies on the premises.

A&B Pilgrimage History : The 1986 pilgrimage to Bath celebrated mass in the Saxon church of St Laurence, Bradford on Avon. The 1999 pilgrimage to Bath had a prayer stop in Holy Trinity, Bradford upon Avon, and like this year, had lunch at The Cross Keys. The pilgrimage has not been to Melksham before.

Profile (Scale 0 to 600 ft): Another very flat day along the River Avon and the Kennet and Avon Canal. The diagram shows what today's profile would be if we didn't go through the tunnels. The lines drawn through the profile show what we are really doing – big hill missed out after 2 miles!



Melksham to Devizes

DAY 4 Tuesday August 15

The route is short and the going is very easy and flat. After initially following suburban roads going south from Melksham, it joins the Kennet and Avon Canal and heads East to Devizes. There is a detour from the canal to visit the 14th century church in Seend, and as we enter Devizes we pas the Caen Hill locks – a very significant feat of canal engineering.



A&B Pilgrimage History : The 2008 pilgrimage from Evesham to Salisbury featured a Chippenham to Devizes day, via the Caen Hill Locks. The 1986 pilgrimage to Bath also went via Devizes.

Profile (Scale 0 to 1000 ft): A mostly flat day along the River Avon and the Kennet and Avon Canal. The hump after 5 miles is where we leave the canal to go to our prayer stop. At the end of the day we climb to Devizes alongside the Caen Hill flight of locks; pedestrians reach the top much quicker than canal boats do!



DAY 5 Wednesday August 16 Rest Day in Devizes

Today is a rest day and so pilgrims are left to their own Devizes! We encourage pilgrims to attend the public 10am communion service in St James Church, where we are staying, listed below. Devizes is famous for its brewery, but sadly Wadworth no longer do brewery tours. We can however visit the Brewery Tap and Shop. See below for details of the museum, the leisure centre and the launderette. Also we could go back and look at the Caen Hill Locks which we walked past yesterday; a St James parishioner who is also a Caen Hill Locks volunteer is keen to show us around.

Services in the St James Church: Holy Communion 10.00

Launderette: The Market Place Launderette is open from 9.00 to 17.30. Service washes are available. **Leisure Centre:** A swimming session costs £5.80. If you don't book in advance, you might find the session is full.



Today's walk takes the more direct route between Devizes and Pewsey, in the morning going over the hills rather than meandering with the canal. We leave Devizes along the canal then pass through Coate (pub only opens at 5pm), All Cannings (church stop and a pub that might be open) and Stanton St Bernard (church stop) before reaching Honeystreet for lunch. After lunch we follow the canal before setting off south towards the Manningfords. Take care crossing the Reading-Exeter railway level crossing. Manningford Abbots church is in private ownership but the footpath runs past it through a lovely churchyard. From here we follow the Pewsey Avon Trail.



Profile (Scale 0 to 1000 ft): We leave the valley of the River Avon and climb steeply into the downs, reaching the highest point of the day on Pewsey Hill. We get almost as high again late in the day in Collingbourne Woods.

A pleasant country walk with plenty of variety. In the morning there are extensive woods but also a wildflower meadow. Look out for butterflies. You might catch a glimpse of the ancient earthwork in the woods after the meadow. Our route into central Andover from the final prayer stop is along the Brenda Parker Way which follows the river Anton and its associated lakes. (Brenda Parker was an esteemed local Ramblers volunteer). Our accommodation tonight is split between two halls, facing each other on opposite sides of Bridge St.

Andover to Winchester

DAY 9 Sunday August 20

LEADER: Sue and Fred Adilz

The morning walk climbs up south of Andover, goes under the A303 and heads south through ancient Harewood Forest, before joining the Test Way and descending into the picturesque village of Wherwell. Wherwell church is close to what remains of Wherwell Abbey (on private land). The walk traverses the wide valley of the River Test via Chilbolton Cow Common, an SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) to the pub. Chilbolton Church has an unusual millennium sculpture of Christ. The afternoon walk leaves the Test Way and climbs steadily past the Radio Telescope on Chilbolton Down, with fine views back, and along a Drove Road via pretty villages of Crawley and Sparsholt, through wide undulating fields and woodland. The walk approaches Winchester on a narrow lane, through the suburbs of Winchester and to the City centre. This is a long walk, but easy underfoot and with one stile.





DAY 12 Wednesday August 23 West Meon to Petersfield 12.5 miles

Today's walk takes us south along the Meon Valley disused railway track and then onto the Monarch's Way to pick up the South Downs Way climbing to reach Old Winchester Hill. We continue north and then east to Whitewool Pond and Meon Springs where there is a Fishing Lodge Cafe. We walk briefly onto a lane and along the South Downs Way. This is a concrete and stoney track but we soon continue straight across a field to reach the road turning left into East Meon for lunch. Here you have a choice of two pubs The Izaak Walton (12.00 - 14.00 pub, cafe and tearoom) or the more expensive - Ye Olde George Inn (12.00-14.15) visited by the Pilgrims in 1989. After lunch and a prayer stop we continue east out of the village and across fields skirting south of Barrow Hill, and through Ramsdean. Then on uneven tracks north east across fields to Stroud Common and on until reaching the A3. We turn left (north) along an overgrown path on the edge of the A3 until reaching a roundabout. We cross here with great care to Petersfield Station and on to our accommodation in two church halls which are directly opposite each other.



Today we follow the Serpent Trail, which runs through the greensand hills which are prominent to the north of the western end of the South Downs. The trail links together areas of heath land and woods, and it lives up to its name as it constantly changes direction until the long downhill stretch towards Midhurst. 
